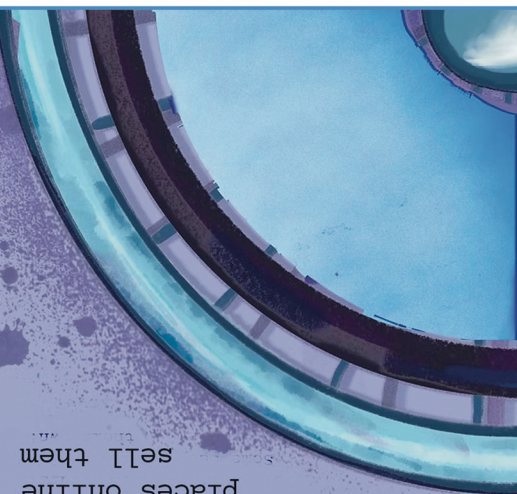
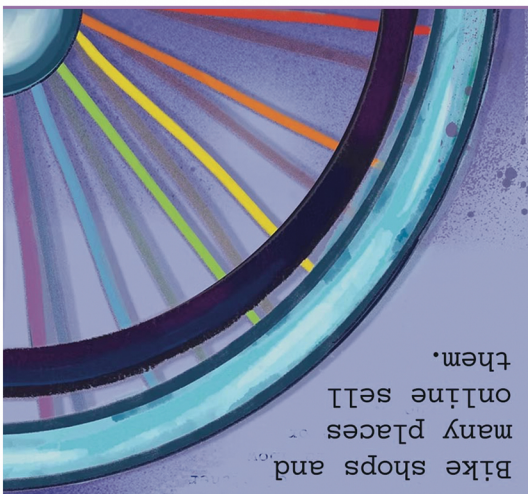




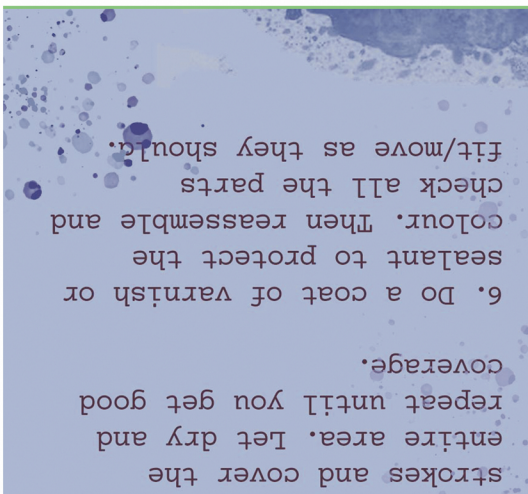
Spoke Guards

Spoke guards are a single plastic sheet that covers the entire wheel. Various places online sell them



Spoke Covers

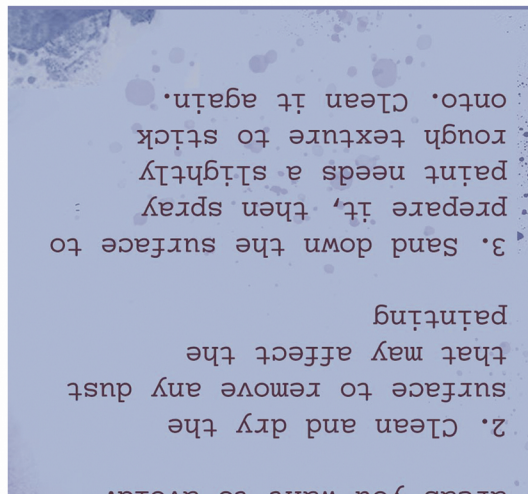
Spoke covers are small, plastic tubes that fit over the individual spokes of your wheel. Bike shops and many places online sell them.



4. In a well ventilated area, paint it with a primer.

5. Do a coat of colour spray, using small, light strokes and cover the entire area. Let dry and repeat until you get good coverage.

6. Do a coat of varnish or sealant to protect the colour. Then reassemble and check all the parts fit/move as they should.

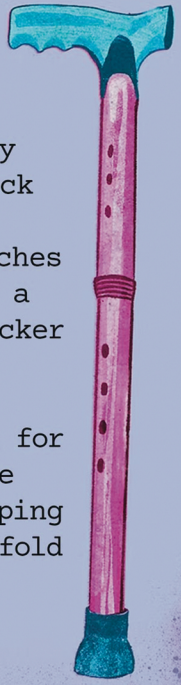


1. Remove the section you want to paint and mask any areas you want to avoid.

2. Clean and dry the surface to remove any dust that may affect the painting

3. Sand down the surface to prepare it, then spray paint needs a slightly rough texture to stick onto. Clean it again.

Duck Tape

Duck tape or sticky vinyl can be a quick and easy way to decorate your crutches or sticks. This is a lot easier and quicker than spray paint.

Measure out enough for each section of the stick and avoid taping across areas that fold or move, and poke through any holes.

Stickers & Badges

Vinyl stickers are a one of the easiest options and will go on any hard surface. They are sem-permanent but can be removed with adhesive remover.

Pins and badges can be attached to any soft surfaces like cushions, backrests and bags.
